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From the Board Chair

s the Middle East Institute enters its 78th year, it stands resilient and influential, continuing its mission to foster understanding and cooperation between the Middle East and the United States.

The past year has been one of significant developments and achievements for our organization.

In 2023, MEI responded rapidly and comprehensively to the October 7 Hamas attack on Israel and the subsequent military campaign in Gaza. Our scholars were highly active in the media, providing expert analysis and insights through top-tier TV and print appearances, rapid press briefings, webinars, and op-eds. This responsiveness solidified our reputation as a vital, trusted source for unbiased, non-partisan information and analysis on the Middle East. We also strengthened our partnership with US Central Command through MEI's Defense and Security Program, bringing together regional analysts and top military practitioners with realworld experience and insight.

The tumultuous and politically sensitive news cycle surrounding October 7 posed significant challenges. MEI leaned on its experts to remain analytical, policy-focused, and centered on exploring solutions to the conflict and the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. This event reshaped regional dynamics, exacerbated power rivalries, increased the risk of a broader Middle East conflict, and created a massive humanitarian



crisis. Meanwhile, its outbreak highlighted critical shortfalls in decades-long efforts toward de-escalation, normalization, and socio-economic development.

Our events in 2023 reflected these themes and more. We honored His Excellency Khaldoon Khalifa Al Mubarak at our Annual Gala, co-hosted the "Resolving the Detainee Crisis" conference with the International Centre for the Study of Radicalisation and Political Violence (ICSR), participated in COP28, and cosponsored the 2023 MENA Forum. These gatherings facilitated vital discussions and fostered meaningful connections among thought leaders, policymakers, and cultural figures.

MEI's media presence reached record heights in 2023, driven by the demand for our expertise on the October 7th fallout and other major regional events.

Our educational and cultural initiatives continued to bring individuals and communities together, with art exhibitions like "Perceptible Rhythms/Alternative Temporalities," "A River Flows Downstream," and "The Sea of Life" highlighting the rich cultural heritage of the region.

Looking ahead, MEI aims to produce high-quality policy analysis and scholarship that is both prescriptive and actionable, all while generating public awareness through media, partnerships, and events. To achieve this, MEI has built a resilient, talented team. Our focus will remain on the Israel-Gaza conflict and its regional impacts, as well as developments in Iran.

We extend our deepest gratitude to outgoing President and CEO Paul Salem for his leadership and vision, and welcome him in his new role as Vice President for International Engagement. We also acknowledge Dr. Susan E. Saxton for her dedication as interim President and CEO, and our staff and scholars who have kept MEI at the forefront of policy discourse during this period of transition.

In this report, I invite you to explore MEI's accomplishments and the ways we continue to reach new heights while staying true to our vital mission.

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RESPONDING TO A REGIONAL CRISIS

Providing Critical Analysis on October 7 and Its Aftermath

vernight, the tragic events of Hamas' October 7 attack on Israel and the collateral devastation that soon followed shifted global attention to the Middle East in a way that has not been seen in decades. As these unfortunate dynamics exposed key knowledge-gaps among media, policymakers, and general audiences alike, MEI quickly initiated a wholeof-organization approach, reorienting our publications, engagements, and programs to address the situation. In doing so MEI not only advanced our mission and reaffirmed our reputation, but established an institutional blueprint for how MEI can quickly adapt to the region's most pressing crises, now and in the future.

In the immediate aftermath of October 7, MEI scholars with a diverse range of expertise appeared across national and international media outlets, providing key insights, expert commentary, and informed predictions. In particular, MEI scholars Khaled Elgindy, Nimrod Goren, Brian Katulis, Randa Slim, Charles Lister, and Firas Maksad emerged as go-to sources in


broadcast, print, and digital media alike. In this period, MEI's impact across these mediums nearly doubled, allowing MEI to steer influential conversations on the conflict in a way that showcased our prioritization of nonpartisanship and advanced our commitment to fostering dialogue.

Institutionally, MEI responded to the conflict with the launch of our new Weekly Virtual Briefings series. Each week MEI hosted a new scholar or practitioner whose expertise offered a unique vantage point, giving our audience a comprehensive perspective on the conflict. Sustained high attendance, which has collectively numbered in the thousands, demonstrates the value of MEI scholarship and the unparalleled access of the MEI network.

MEI's outputs related to the conflict will continue to emphasize pathways to a lasting resolution. Until then, the dexterity, rapidity, and focus demonstrated by our scholars and staff ensures MEI will remain a go-to source of information for the duration of the conflict, its eventual day-after, and for any future crisis scenario that emerges from across the Middle East.













STRENGTHENING DEFENSE PARTNERSHIPS

MEI-CENTCOM collaboration brings together top military leaders and analysts

he geopolitical landscape of 2023 underscored the urgent need for increased dialogue and military cooperation between the United States and its partners in the Middle East and beyond. Events such as the war in Gaza and the solidification of the Hezbollah-Iran-Houthi axis raised pressing questions about US military strategy in the region. How will the US and its allies respond to these evolving threats that challenge its regional position?

To help address these critical issues, the Middle East Institute has deepened its strategic relationship with US Central Command (CENTCOM). In May 2023, MEI hosted its third annual MEI-CENTCOM Conference, bringing together top CENTCOM leadership alongside scholars and practitioners to discuss the most pressing security challenges facing the region. This conference continues to serve as a key platform for fostering dialogue and cooperation between military and civilian experts.

Further cementing this partnership, General (Ret.) John P. Abizaid, CENTCOM's longestserving commander, was elected Chairman of MEI's Board of Governors. His selection reflects MEI's commitment to integrating

military expertise into its leadership, ensuring that the Institute remains at the forefront of discussions on US security priorities in the Middle East.

In September, MEI hosted its inaugural CENTCOM Commanders Council Dinner, a significant event that featured a discussion with retired Generals John Abizaid, Joseph Votel, Frank McKenzie, and Anthony Zinni. The evening also included remarks from Maj. Gen. Sean M. Salene, CENTCOM's current Director of Strategy, Plans, and Policy (J5), highlighting the critical role of military leadership in shaping US policy in the region.

Looking ahead, MEI's special relationship with CENTCOM is poised to grow and expand. As this partnership deepens, MEI will continue to lead essential conversations on how to strengthen military cooperation with regional allies, mitigate risks, and deter common adversaries, ensuring that US security strategies remain robust and effective in an increasingly complex geopolitical environment.

UNDERSTANDING TURKEY AT 100

MEI's Turkey Program was a key resource for policymakers during a tumultuous year

he centenery of the Turkish Republic in 2023 was a milestone year for Turkey amid one of the most consequential periods in its history. The Middle East Institute's Turkish Studies Program, under the leadership of its founding director, Gönül Tol, played a pivotal role in shaping the discourse around Turkey's political and social landscape during this critical year.

The highlight of the program's activities was the 12th Annual Turkey Conference, held TRONGMAN'S on December 6, 2023, at the historic National Press Building in Washington, DC. The conference, titled "Turkey at 100," brought together a diverse group of scholars, policymakers, and diplomats to address Turkey's pressing issues. The discussions delved into the aftermath of the February 2023 earthquakes, the

country's ongoing economic challenges, and the high-stakes May 2023 presidential elections.

Gönül Tol's influence extended far beyond the conference. As one of the leading Turkey analysts in Washington, her insights were sought after by major media outlets. She gave numerous interviews and her work was featured in esteemed publications such as Foreign Policy and the Financial Times. Tol's monthly

columns in FT continue to influence the global understanding of Turkey's evolving political landscape, while her analyses, particularly on the Turkish government's response to the earthquakes and the dynamics of the May elections, have shaped public discourse. Notably, Fareed Zakaria cited one of her articles on his

program "GPS," underscoring her impact on informing international perspectives.

Beyond her media presence, Tol actively engaged with US





policymakers, briefing Congress, the CIA, NSC, NIC, State Department, and DoD on Turkey's elections. Her book, Erdoğan's War, garnered critical acclaim, further elevating the visibility of MEI's Turkish Studies Program.

Through these efforts, Gönül Tol and the Turkish Studies Program at MEI have solidified their positions as leading voices in the analysis of Turkey's future during a pivotal moment in the country's history.

Policy Center

The Policy Center, led by Vice President for Policy Brian Katulis, is the hub for MEI's expert analysis on political, social, security, and economic developments in the Middle East. Hosting 17 distinct programs and nearly 200 affiliated regional experts, the depth and diversity of viewpoints represented sets MEI apart as the leading US think tank on Middle Eastern affairs.

US-Middle East Policy Brian Katulis

Policy Center Vice President Brian Katulis launched a key initiative in 2023 to assess the Biden administration's Middle East policy approach. The multi-year assessment was published as a major report, titled "Treading Cautiously on Shifting Sands," and launched with a high-profile public panel featuring Katulis, along with Middle East experts Kristen Fontenrose, Vali Nasr, and Dennis Ross. The initiative examines Biden administration policies and issues periodic report cards grading the impact of notable decisions and progress toward strategic objectives.

Iran

MEI's Iran Program covers Iranian domestic politics, civil society, and social trends, as well as Tehran's geopolitical competition with other regional countries. In 2023, the program continued to publish expert analysis on a range of key issues both within Iran and the wider region. Coverage included Iran's relations with Hamas and Hezbollah in the aftermath of the 2023 war in Gaza; Tehran's sponsorship of the Houthis in Yemen, including the

supply of weapons; Tehran's ability to overcome Western sanctions by moving closer to Russia, China, and other countries around the world; and the regional implications of the Chinese-brokered Iran-Saudi normalization agreement.

Lebanon

The Middle East Institute's Lebanon Program is at the forefront of shaping the policy discourse on Lebanon for both American and international audiences. Dedicated to identifying and promoting viable solutions for Lebanon amidst the multifaceted crises it has faced since 2019, the program made significant strides in 2023. Key initiatives included a series of in-depth articles addressing the presidential vacuum, advocating for an international fact-finding mission into the 2020 blast at the Port of Beirut, and proposing innovative donor strategies to alleviate Lebanon's escalating economic crisis. In light of the increased violence since October, the Lebanon Program has provided timely analysis on the prospects of war and explored diplomatic avenues to prevent broader conflict through a variety of platforms, including articles, podcasts, and webinars.

Turkey Gönül Tol

The Turkey Studies Program at MEI is a leading source of analysis on Turkey's political, economic, and social developments. This was particularly true in 2023, a pivotal year marking the Republic's centenary, during which the program produced 82 publications, hosted 13 events, and held 9 virtual press briefings in response to Turkey's critical issues, including the May presidential elections and the February earthquakes. Program Director Gönül Tol made numerous media appearances, informing international discourse through articles and interviews. Her work ensured that MEI's perspectives were widely recognized and influential in shaping US and global policy considerations regarding Turkey.

Syria

Charles Lister

MEI's Syria Program aims to remain at the forefront of insightful and grounded research and analysis on all things Syria to better inform a wide range of audiences and to help sustain and shape a more meaningful policy-oriented dialogue. The Syria Program covers the country's internal affairs, ongoing crisis, and domestic conflict - focusing specifically on its political, economic, legal, social, ethnic,

and religious aspects. In 2023, MEI's Syria Program remained the world's leading English-language source of timely and unique policy research into all aspects of the crisis in Syria. This included dozens of publications in English and Arabic as well as numerous high-profile events, notably with famed Syrian political philosopher Yassin al-Haj Saleh, marking his first visit to the United States, and others focused on the catastrophic February earthquake and a decade of regime militias. In recognition of the leading role played by MEI's Syria Program, the Doha Forum invited MEI to be an institutional partner for the first time in 2023, hosting an MEI panel on Syria policy. That panel brought together Hadi al-Bahra (President, Syria's National Coalition), Geir Pedersen (UN Special Envoy for Syria), Brigitte Curmi (French Special Envoy to Syria), and Ann Snow (UK Special Envoy to Syria) and was moderated by MEI Program Director Charles Lister. Late in 2023, MEI's Syria Program entered into a strategic partnership with the Atlantic Council and European Institute of Peace to launch (in early-2024) the Syria Strategy Project – an unprecedented initiative involving more than 100 experts and 30 governments and Syrian governing stakeholders to brainstorm, negotiate, and design a comprehensive multilateral vision to resolve Syria's crisis.



Palestine & Palestinian-Israeli Affairs

MEI's Palestine and Palestinian-Israeli Affairs Program looks at the future of Palestinian politics and the Palestinian national movement, prospects for a peaceful resolution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, as well as Palestine's role in the stability of the broader Middle East. During the first half of 2023, the program produced numerous publications and events on the widening violence in the West Bank and growing extremism within Israeli politics. In the second half of the year, the program focused on convening a major conference as well as responding to the October 7 attack and its aftermath. In September, the program, together with the European Council on Foreign Relations (ECFR), convened a special two-day conference, titled "Oslo at 30: Legacies, Hard Realities, and Alternatives for Israel-Palestine," which examined the aftermath of the Oslo process, ways to address today's difficult realities on the ground, and alternative strategies and outcomes for the future. In the wake of the October 7 attack and the ensuing war on Gaza, the program put out numerous publications, including a major op-ed in Newsweek on the dangers of dehumanizing Palestinians in the US media and political discourse and a widely circulated essay in Foreign Affairs on the prospects for a Palestinian political revival following the Israeli assault on Gaza.

Defense and Security

MEI's Defense and Security Program provides rigorous, multidisciplinary analysis of current and emerging defense and security challenges facing the United States and its regional partners. The program serves as a unique, credible platform for defense and security stakeholders from the US and the Middle East to interact, exchange views, and share experiences on national security

matters. In 2023, the program deepened its strategic collaboration with US Central Command (CENTCOM), hosting the third annual MEI-CENTCOM Conference in May, which brought together top CENTCOM leadership, scholars, and practitioners to address key security challenges.

Countering Terrorism and Extremism

Charles Lister

MEI's Countering Terrorism and Extremism Program generates locally rooted insights into today's and tomorrow's security threats – understanding their origins, motivations, and how to effectively counter them. In 2023, the program hosted two major international conferences as part of its Resolving the Detainee Crisis Initiative, a collaboration with King's College London. This initiative addresses the ongoing crisis of detaining 10,000 ISIS militants and 50,000 family members in northeast Syria. Notably, in June, MEI convened Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) member states in Vienna to enhance coordination on repatriations and improve security in detention facilities. In October, MEI hosted closed-door negotiations in Washington, DC, bringing together 25 governments, the UN, the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), and human rights

groups to discuss solutions. Program Director Charles Lister's expertise was further recognized when he accompanied US CENTCOM Commander Gen. Michael E. Kurilla to inspect detention camps and military bases in Syria. Following Hamas' assault on Israel, the program also became a leading source of analysis on Hamas and Iran's network of militant proxies across the region.

Israel

Nimrod Goren

MEI launched its Israel Initiative in 2023, led by the Institute's first Senior Fellow for Israeli Affairs, Nimrod Goren. The initiative aims to enhance understanding of Israel's domestic politics and foreign affairs, focusing on national governance issues, Israeli-Palestinian peacemaking, and Israel's regional relations. Key topics

in 2023 included the country's judicial overhaul and the pro-democracy protests, the impact of Israel's far-right coalition, and the October 7 Hamas terror attack. MEI published reports on Israel's evolving democracy, regional relations, and environmental cooperation. Israeli scholars contributed to policy papers, webinars, and briefings, and MEI's commentary was featured in top-tier media.

Black Sea

Iulia-Sabina Joja

MEI's Black Sea Program (BSP) explores interactions among countries in the extended Black Sea area - Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Georgia, Moldova, Romania, Russia, Turkey, and Ukraine with the Middle East, Russia, and China. The BSP examines security, political, economic, and energy relationships as



well as trends that are likely to grow in strategic importance. In 2023, the program focused on the implications of war in Ukraine and unrest in the South Caucasus. The BSP managed the second and third iterations of a State Department grant, hosting US researchers who traveled to the wider Black Sea region and conducted research relevant to US regional policy. Program director Iulia Joja obtained a large book grant over two years from the Smith Richardson Foundation to analyze strategic competition between Russia, China, and Iran in the Black Sea region.

Afghanistan & Pakistan **Studies**

The Afghanistan and Pakistan Studies Program at MEI provides a nuanced understanding of the economic, political, social, and foreign policy dynamics of these two countries. The program produces opinion pieces, articles, and in-depth reports to promote dialogue and knowledge about Afghanistan and Pakistan in the United States. In 2023, the program provided regular commentary about major developments in Afghanistan and Pakistan, publishing 28 briefings, 14 articles, and 4 reports. Through interviews and meetings, the program also informed the media and policymakers in the Washington community.

Arabian Peninsula Affairs Gerald Feierstein

MEI's Arabian Peninsula Affairs Program analyzes major issues and opportunities in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) member states to broaden American understanding of the region. In 2023, the program organized an MEI delegation trip to Qatar and hosted a group of Qatari diplomats in the US on a study program. The program also examines developments in the broader neighborhood, including Yemen and Iran. In 2023, the program launched, in collaboration with the Iran Program, a new series of analyses focusing on the Houthi-Iran nexus, which is challenging regional security and stability. Moreover, it hosted a half-day conference on "Building a New Yemen." Program Director Amb. Feierstein continued to lead



The Middle East Journal

The Middle East Journal is the oldest peer-reviewed publication in North America dedicated to the study of the modern Middle East. First printed in 1947, the Journal continues to present readers with original and objective academic research and analysis on the area from Morocco to Pakistan, as well as expert reviews of new works in regional scholarship. In 2023, the Journal published issues spotlighting problems facing democracy in Israel, oil-driven development in

Oman, Turkish-Syrian relations, and diplomacy and media in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Other articles included studies of sectarianism and Islamism in Egypt, political parties in Iran and Lebanon, the causes of the Iran-Iraq War, Arab media coverage of China's repression of the Uyghurs, and the potential for green urban reforms in Cairo. Contributors included upand-coming scholars in the region and around the world as well as established names in North America like former Middle East Studies Association president Laurie Brand, Ambassador Daniel Kurtzer, Rice University's Jim Krane, the American Enterprise Institute's Kenneth Pollack, Washington Post columnist Shadi Hamid, and Temple University's Sean Yom.

MEI's Ambassador Series Program, which, in 2023, hosted ambassadors from Bahrain, Israel, Algeria, Qatar, Tunisia, and Pakistan.


Egypt & the Horn of Africa Mirette Mabrouk

MEI's Egypt & the Horn of Africa Program focuses on economic, political, and security developments in Egypt and the Horn as well as this region's role and relevance to US policy. The program also examined Egypt's domestic affairs, geopolitical ties to its African neighbors, and priority relations with the United States. The program is working to develop the same reputation for incisive, nonpartisan coverage and analysis of the Horn as it has already earned for its work on Egypt, and it has seen a steady uptick in media coverage and cooperation with peer organizations abroad. That reputation also resulted in Egypt's Foreign Minister Sameh Shoukry choosing MEI to host an exclusive roundtable at its office.

North Africa and the Sahel

Intissar Fakir

In 2023, the MEI's North Africa and Sahel (NAS) Program prioritized policy engagement on the region's key trends, offering concrete recommendations for pressing issues. Working with policy makers in the EU and the US and civil society groups, the program's director and



non-resident fellows engaged in a series of initiatives, such as a high-level advisory group on EU policy innovation, private briefings, and advisory sessions with EU officials, including the special envoy for the Mediterranean and German, US, Spanish, and French policymakers, diplomats, and military leadership. The program participated in various international forums, including the Middle East Dialogue's (MED) landmark annual meeting. The program's director and scholars presented their research on thematic priorities of energy transition and security, migration, domestic stability and political regression, and geopolitical competition in North Africa and the Sahel. NAS continues to bring novel and innovative perspectives on regional and domestic challenges to audiences with the potential to build closer ties, promote shared peace and prosperity, and have a meaningful impact on policy outcomes.

Economics and Energy Colby Connelly

The Economics and Energy Program at MEI continues to focus on the evolution of the energy sector across the Middle East region as it increasingly seeks to adapt to both changes in global markets and unique, evolving needs in each country. The program began 2023 by holding a full-day conference on natural gas developments in the Eastern Mediterranean, which was attended by figures from the energy industry, diplomatic community, and academia. It also held a webinar on the ongoing impact of the Russia-Ukraine war on MENA economies with the Italian Institute for International Political Studies (ISPI) and the Policy Center for the New South. In addition, the program completed work on "Energy Transitions in the Middle East: Challenges and Opportunities," an edited volume published in January 2024.

MEI Senior Fellow Dr. Karen Young moderates a panel titled "Structural Reforms to Reinvigorate Growth in MENA," held October 10, 2023 in Marrakech, Morocco, as part of the International Monetary Fund's Annual Meetings.

Conflict Resolution and Track II Dialogues Randa Slim

MEI's Conflict Resolution and Track II Dialogues Program helps to maintain the lines of communication on issues critical to inter-state relationships and provides platforms for independent, open discussion on political and security issues with participants from the public and private sectors. The program hosts three Track II Dialogues annually. The Middle East Dialogue (MED) brings together policymakers, academics, and experts from across the MENA region, including the Gulf states, Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey. MED runs parallel to two separate Dialogues that convene stakeholders with material investment and involvement in the region, namely the United States, Russia, and Turkey, in separate spaces. These three concurrent discussion platforms seek to inform each other and provide spaces for analysis and

problem solving.

Strategic Foresight **Initiative**

MEI's Strategic Foresight Initiative (SFI) examines key drivers of change, developing and analyzing alternative future scenarios across a wide range of issues and topics relevant to the region. The program employs a variety of methods to help regional and US decision-makers chart courses that can lead to preferred MENA futures. In 2023, the program conducted a major analysis for the UN Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) on alternative future pathways for how "the Metaverse" will transform the Arab region between now and 2040. SFI was invited by the Dubai Future Foundation (DFF) to join its Global Futures Society, which convenes futurists and foresight analysts from multiple regions and sectors for multi-institutional collaborations. The program also partnered with the National Council on US-Arab Relations on a two-day conference entitled "The Road to 2050: An Assessment of Arab Regional Possibilities and the Future of US Cooperation" and facilitated a convening of Arab region civil society organizations as part of a futures project being conducted by the Canadian government.




Strategic Technologies and **Cyber Security**

MEI's Strategic Technologies and Cyber Security Program examines the impact of emerging technologies on the Middle East, focusing on the rise of new tech powers and fostering opportunities for US-regional tech cooperation. In 2023, the program covered a range of critical topics, including the implications of smart city development in the Gulf, the global governance of artificial intelligence (AI), and the strategic importance of the Middle East's critical minerals for the clean energy transition. Key publications also analyzed the US National Cybersecurity Strategy and the growing Indo-Israeli strategic cyber partnership. The program hosted a high-profile discussion on navigating the US-China tech cold war, and it facilitated dialogues on leveraging climate tech and the global semiconductor industry.

Climate and Water

MEI's Climate and Water Program seeks to assess and understand the broader impacts of climate change in the region, with emphasis on water resource management, sustainability, and environmental protection. The program also explores the use of water and environmental policy, climate adaptation and mitigation, and green initiatives to enhance the climate resilience of the Middle East and North Africa. In 2023, the program hosted Climate Week 2023, a virtual conference building off the outcomes of the 2022 UN Climate Change Conference (27th Conference of the Parties, COP27) meeting in Egypt and setting the stage for the COP28 climate meeting held in November in the UAE. The program also participated in several side events set around COP28.

"Perceptible Rhythms/Alternative Temporalities" featured 12 artists from the Middle East and South Asia who examine the impact of conflict, urbanization, and the climate crisis on their environments and the ways in which humankind can better care for the planet. Using multimedia, installation, photography, drawing, and painting, they explore ways to live in harmony with the planet by reconnecting with past cultural histories, remembering extinct plant species, and imagining alternative ways for humankind to attune to nature.

A River Flows Downstream

"A River Flows Downstream" explored the concept of a river journey into the disparate world of ecosystems in different space and time. While drifting downstream through the various works on display, the viewer was invited by each of the eight participating artists into their lived world to witness the shifting ecological and cultural landscapes that they inhabit. Through the lens of each artist, the photography exhibition narrated the diversity and complexity of these ever-changing landscapes interconnected by their reliance on the abundance of water.

The Sea of Life: Modern and Contemporary Art from The Kingdom of Bahrain

"The Sea of Life" featured the works of 14 artists spanning different art forms and generations, exploring their connection to their natural and built environment and the symbolism of water in their lives. The title plays on the concept of "The Tree of Life," a widespread symbol among some cultures and religions. On Bahrain Island, water has been this lifeforce. Both the sea and the island's freshwater springs are linked to its prosperity and regarded as precious commodities to cherish and preserve, creating a powerful connection between the people of Bahrain and their natural environment.

In 2023, MEI's Arts & Culture Center focused on engaging with local Washington, DC, communities through a rich program of concerts, films, comedy shows, and exhibitionrelated programming such as open houses and artist talks. Audiences packed musical performances at the Barns at Wolf Trap and joined MEI for film screenings and a Middle Eastern comedy show, underscoring the important role the Center plays as a bridge between two cultures.
